

DAY CAPTAINS REPORT

Rockbourne remains one of my favourite fisheries, and certainly the most picturesque, with 6 lakes set intimately amongst some pristine New Forest countryside.

This was the club's first return to Rockbourne since September 2020, when despite an enjoyable day, conditions were definitely more challenging. This time, set against largely blue skies and more than a hint of Spring warmth in the air, the fish proved to be far more obliging, with 19 of the 25 anglers catching their 4 fish bag.

For this visit, for the morning session we decided to organise into 5 groups of five, rotating clockwise through the lakes in 45-minute sessions – the aim to give everyone a fair chance of fishing each of the lakes. And within minutes of the horn sounding, Group B on Oak were into some hard fighting fish, Peter taking a 11.01 Rainbow on the first few casts, and Joe quickly putting behind him the disappointment of a blank on the previous visit. Colin, Geoff and Ian were also soon into fish, setting the tone for what was generally a productive morning all round. The dark waters of Spring generally proved to be a bit more challenging, but on Alder, Bridge and Oak in particular, fish continued to be caught regularly, falling to a range of flies including damsels, stalking bugs, small nymphs and buzzers.

Then one of the highlights of the day... breaking for a BBQ lunch in the Rockbourne lodge to celebrate the club's 35th anniversary. And what a fine spread it was too, accompanied by drinks and some alcohol-free wine (thank you Michael!), most enjoyable, and a great opportunity to catch up on some chit chat and socialising.

After lunch we returned to the lakes, most people in search of one or two fish to complete their tickets, which most of us managed to do before the weigh in at 4 o'clock.

In total 92 fish were banked at an average weight of 4lb, with 3 doubles nudging up the average stockie weight of 3.5 to 4lb. Best fish of the day went to Dave Haskins, a 13.14 Rainbow from Alder, who also managed the best bag of the day at 25lb exactly. Dave Broome and Peter Burdett also managed double figure Rainbows, 12.10 and 11.01 respectively.

As I mentioned in my talk at the beginning of the day, a lot of the regulars that fish Rockbourne choose to stalk the better fish – and I think really that is the challenge that Rockbourne has to offer. In the afternoon I spent 20 minutes or so with Simeon, the fishery manager, during which time he demonstrated his phenomenal fish spotting abilities (although to be fair he probably sees fish in his sleep…), jinking between the shadows cast from the trees on the far bank, pointing out one double after another. I must admit, I struggled to see most of the fish he was pointing out, but it occurred to me that for many of the regulars, this is the challenge, finding and then targeting those better fish. Alas, despite strong interest from a large Rainbow on one occasion, the only fish I managed was a stockie that nipped in as my fly disappeared into the dark where I'd cast it in the vicinity of a nice brown that Simeon had pointed out.

Overall, I think everyone really enjoyed the day, the feedback on the morning structure was certainly positive, and most of us managed to catch our full ticket. The lunch was a highlight, and just to spend a day with friends in such a wonderful location was special.

We caught 92 fish weighing a staggering 365 lbs with three double Rainbows, the biggest being 13lb 14ozs by Dave Haskins who won the trophy for the day, and I must congratulate Summer for her lovely Brown of 5lb 2ozs. Somehow the double Browns avoided our flies on this occasion, maybe next time!

As I said previously it was a great day socially among friends, and good to see our three lady members doing well.

Thanks to virtually everyone for staying till the very end, you all made this a very special day. I look forward to seeing you all at Lakedown where Joe Tufo has kindly offered to sponsor lunch.

A Little Tip:

Observe the fly life on the banks

While still water trout will happily take blob's, blue flash damsels, cat's whiskers, squirmy wormies and yellow dancers all day every day, they're going to predominantly be used to feeding upon naturals either in the water or landing upon the water. It pays to observe and look at what's hatching on the banks if you spot flies touching the water or crawling around then do try switching to smaller more natural patterns.

Unsurprisingly it's often very effective and if you can, then pull yourself away from the lures and the blob's.

If you see flies around try matching the Hatch






